Money Scramble - A Scottish tradition practised in the village when, after a wedding, the village people tied the gates expecting the groom to throw money, normally small change, over the gate to allow the couple to cut the string to get out. Adults as well as children, who were encouraged by the vicar to attend, gathered up the cash.

Margaret Lygoe remembers one occasion when the children had not been invited because the bride and groom were "posh". To their joy, however, they had come unprepared and the groom had to throw larger coins to buy his way out and before anyone would lend him a knife. She got a half crown instead of the usual halfpennies.
